Letter From the Pastor:

A few weeks ago, I read a fascinating blog post by Rev. Anne Russ on her blog, Doubting Believer. Rev. Russ wrote about Edward Locard, a French pioneer in forensic science, who developed something called the Exchange Principle: "Every contact leaves a trace." (You can read it here:

https://resources.doubtingbeliever.com/blog/ce0dd542-8590-4a9c-bd5d-77f646336450)

In forensic science, this means that a criminal always leaves something behind at the scene of a crime and always takes something with them. Even with gloves, masks, or protective suits, something is left and something is taken. Trace evidence is inevitable.

Rev. Russ suggests that this principle doesn't just apply to crime; it's true for all of life. Every interaction we have with another person leaves a trace, whether we intend it or not. The words we speak, the smiles we share, even the way we listen. We all leave marks on each other's lives, whether it is the cashier at the store, a friend in need, or a stranger on the street. And sometimes, the marks we leave can lift someone's day, strengthen their spirit, or remind them of God's love. Other times, the traces can weigh people down.

As followers of Jesus, we are called to be intentional about the traces we leave behind. Colossians 3:12-14 reminds us to clothe ourselves with compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness, and patience, and to forgive and love one another. If every contact leaves a trace, what better evidence of our faith could there be than love reflected in our words and actions?

At the same time, Rev. Russ reminds us that we must also be mindful of the marks we pick up from others, like hurt, worry, judgment, or negativity, that aren't meant to stay with us. God invites us to release what doesn't serve life and love, to let Christ's mercy wash away what we need to let go of.

This month, I invite you to consider your traces. What are you leaving behind? What are you taking with you? May every encounter reflect God's grace, and may the traces we leave be ones that bless, encourage, and draw others closer to Jesus.

Mission of the Month - Funds for Leaders

The Evangelical Lutheran Church in America Fund for Leaders has been offering scholarships for students at ELCA seminaries who are pursuing rostered ministry in the ELCA since 2000. We seek people who are passionate about Jesus Christ, spiritually grounded, ecumenically oriented, and committed to growing their leadership capacity in an increasingly complex world.

The ELCA Fund for Leaders scholarship program supports students of tremendous promise who attend ELCA seminaries. By making seminary more affordable, ELCA Fund for Leaders enables more future ministers to go to seminary and helps them graduate with less debt, empowering those whom God calls into rostered leadership to serve the church wherever they are needed most.

We've come a long way since the ELCA Fund for Leaders was established over 25 years ago, but we still have a way to go. Reaching \$100 million in endowment funds would permit us to award \$4 million in scholarships every year, supporting nearly 50 new students! In just the last five years our distribution of funds has grown from \$2 million to \$3 million. With your help we can grow that figure by another million dollars.

We are a thriving church, and each of us has a unique role to play in helping the mission and ministry of the church. Your gifts to the ELCA Fund for Leaders not only support students now but also invest in our church's future.

Did You Know??

The Outside the Box Outreach committee recently invited representatives from the Tri-County Boys and Girls Club, Berlin site to inform them about their organization. Committee members were surprised about the very real need of area children and impressed by how the club personnel attempt to meet the needs.

Ashley Bartol and Madyson Main, representatives from the Tri-County Boys and Girls Club located in Berlin, were then given time to make a presentation about their organization.

The new club in Ripon will serve birth-18 once all requirements connected to infant care have been met. Berlin's club serves ages 5-summer after high school graduation or age 18. Berlin's club provides after school care, non-school day care, and summer care. Children are fed as soon as they arrive after school. There is a cook on site. During the school year the club partners with the Berlin Area School District so their meals meet similar dietary requirements as the school district.

Fees right now are \$25.00 a year per member. There is also a \$200.00/semester fee that will cover non-school day care for families. Scholarships are available to help cover costs if parents have qualified for free and reduced lunch through the school district. The Berlin site sees approximately 200 children. They also have an employee at the middle school and high school checking in with identified students.

One of the main programs run through the Berlin site is named Unmet Needs Program. This particular program is available for community help and participation.

- Operation Backpack provides school supplies for children and a hygiene bag is available for teens. There
 were over 470 backpacks given to youth in August 2025. Donations were provided by individuals or
 businesses.
- Coats for Kids targets ages 3-18. Coats, gloves, mittens, hats, boots are provided. Every child needing a coat is guaranteed a coat. The remaining items are donated and are dispersed while supplies last. Community members can also donate to this program.
- Thanksgiving meals are offered through Crossroads Market. In 2024, 91 meals were donated to area community families. In 2025 100 meals will be provided to families who are members of the boys and girls club. If transportation is a problem, an employee of the club will pick up and deliver the meal.
- Adopt a Family depends on community participation. 250 youth were able to have a Christmas with gifts in 2024. Donors will adopt a family, receive a list for a child and purchase all items on that list. Volunteers are always needed to wrap gifts.

Some of the smaller programs available to youth include the Traveling clothes closet coming from Menasha every other month. Families can come "shop" for clothes at no cost. Feeding America provides non-perishable food and Kwik Trip coupons for perishable items every 2 weeks. For teens with a job but no transportation the club will help to get that individual to the job site.

There is also personal health support available, especially for dental and vision needs. There are no dental providers in Berlin accepting Medicaid patients and limited vision appointments for those on Medicaid. The club employees may have to transport as far as Waupaca to meet those needs.


