

From the Pastor:

"Behold, I am doing a new thing; now it springs forth, do you not perceive it? I will make a way in the wilderness and rivers in the desert." Isaiah 43:19

In a meeting with our synod staff a couple of months ago, Pastor Dara Clifford, the Director for Evangelical Mission, shared a document with us called Holy Conversations. She encouraged all congregations to use this resource as a tool for conversations. I gave copies of the questions to our church council and asked council members to take time to



The first page of questions invites us to reflect on the previous 10 years in our congregation.

- 1. Do we have a pattern of growth in attendance?
- 2. Will that trend allow us to thrive and develop ministry for the future?
- 3. Can we maintain our own existence and provide ministry in the community?
- 4. Can we survive without some form of life support from bequests, or special gifts?
- 5. Do we have sufficient numbers of people to volunteer for ministry within the congregation and outreach into the community?
- 6. Are new efforts in evangelism and Christian education feasible?
- 7. Are there sufficient funds and interested membership to do ministry within the congregation as well as outreach and evangelism into the community and world?
- 8. Are we experiencing the presence of first-time visitors on a regular basis?
- 9. Do they return for a second or a third visit?
- 10. Do 20-25% of our first-time visitors eventually join the congregation?
- 11. Is the congregation's main focus on outreach/evangelism?
- 12. Is the congregation striving to do more than trying to survive/keep the doors open?
- 13. Has the congregation grown in the last five years?
- 14. Do we have enough members to do ministry well?
- 15. Does giving in the congregation enable "Great Commission" work, or does most of the giving go towards maintenance and survival?
- 16. Are there young families active in the church?
- 17. Are the demographics (age, race, gender, etc.) of your congregation reflective of the community you are located in?
- 18. Has the congregation maintained a good level of stewardship including several families (10-12) who tithe faithfully to the congregation?
- 19. Is the congregation willing/able to adapt its ministry and lifestyle in order to develop the ministries that will meet the needs of a changing community?
- 20. Is the present facility physically adaptable for use?
- 21. Can the congregation afford the repairs that are needed to use these facilities for ministry?

The second page of questions is more reflective:

- 1. What exciting thing has God done in your midst [congregation] in the last year?
- 2. Where is your congregation afraid?
- 3. What is your dream for your congregation?

I would add one more, Where do you think God is leading us, guiding us, directing us as a congregation for the future of the church?

As I have asked the council members, I now ask you to take some time and reflect on these questions.



If you are willing, jot down some of your thoughts and share them with me or a council member. Together we can discern where God is at work making all things new.

President Heidi Schramer called the meeting to order.

De Anna Lueptow provided opening prayer

Approval of the Agenda. Motion made by Craig Chovanec to approve the agenda as written, seconded by Jody Ziemann, motion carried

Concerns from the audience. None.

Secretary's Report. Meeting minutes from 7.10.23 reviewed, no corrections noted. Motion made Cindy Wallace to accept report as written, seconded by Gene Hess, motion carried.

Treasurer's Report. Printed copies of the treasurer's report, check detail and investment profile provided and reviewed. No discussion on reports, motion made by Jody Ziemann to accept reports as written, seconded by Bob Prellwitz, motion carried.

Unfinished Business.

Drawn to the Word Joint Service 9.24.23 at 10:00 am.

Council members will serve as greeters and hosts for the service and potluck following. Committee members Heidi Schramer, Cindy Wallace, De Anna Lueptow and Michelle Klawitter will meet on 8.20.23 following service to finalize potluck plans. A donor has come forth, donating 1/2 of the cost of the painting, bringing our cost to \$1925.00. The finished painting will measure 5 x 6 feet, horizontally. Discussion on the placement of the finished painting. The committee, along with the donor's input, have recommended that the painting be hung on the wall in front of and above the choir loft. The frame for the painting needs building, once built Barb Bellmer will stretch the canvas over the frame. Paul Oman requested permission to sell items at the event. New Business.

Request from Paige Soper to become an Associate Member of Grace. Discussion included the reading of our Constitution Bylaws. Council members provided positive testimony about her current and future involvement in ministry. Motion made by Gene Hess to approve Paige as an Associate Member of Grace, seconded by Craig, motion carried.

Reformation Sunday (10.31.23) tee shirts. Discussion held on possible purchase. If members have interest, we will plan to purchase locally.

Pastor's Insurance Policy. Discussion held on current policy. Sandy Peschke was able to provide insight into the current policy for the council and states an increase in cost of 2.5 % from previous year. Pastor included that she likes the present policy. Motion made by De Anna Lueptow to continue with the current policy, seconded by Gene Hess, motion carried.

Committee Reports.

Pastor Report.

Report included Pastoral Acts of funerals for Ann Hochrein and Geraldine Robinson. Visitations to June Lubbert, Roland Bahr, Gerry Robinson and her family. Intern Kathy visited all other homebound members before she concluded her internship. List of current and ongoing activities at Grace include; studying and prepared some Sunday sermons, met weekly for supervisory sessions with Intern Kathy and finished the internship evaluation, studied and prepared for Bible study on Romans, weekly meetings with staff, attended book club discussion and lunch, worked with Christian Ed committee to plan upcoming Sunday School year, wrote a letter to Sunday School families, worked on a letter and outline for the Confirmation year, pre-recorded worship for online and radio on Worship in the Park Sunday, worked with the Drawn to the Word planning team, met with the Worship and Christian Education Committees, wrote article for newsletter, met with Robinson family for funeral planning, attended the Global Leadership Summit for continuing education, a 90th birthday party, and lunch with the internship committee, and took two weeks of vacation. Pastor also reported that the Synod has shared a document called Holy Conversations. Included in the document was a questionnaire regarding congregations vitality and sustainability. She requested members to review and hold discussions at upcoming meetings.

Buildings and Grounds.

Bob Prellwitz reported the group met this date. Ongoing activities include; lawn and landscape maintenance. The dead ash tree and stump have been removed, grass seed will be planted and the Women of Grace have asked to purchase the replacement tree. The group is looking at top dressing and seeding the rough portions of the lawn. Martens Heating and Cooling has replaced the heat exchangers and one motor, and completed AC check. The northeast door maintenance is upcoming, along with touch up painting in the hallways. The group will reach out to the snow plowing service for upcoming winter and service the snowblower. Next meeting is 10.9.23 at 6pm.

Christian Education.

Sunday School will begin 9.10.23, with a 'build a donut or bagel bar' following service. Registration forms have been sent out and are due back to the office on 9.1.23. Sunday School curriculum has been electronically ordered and will align with the weekly lesson/sermons. Teachers are looking to incorporate music into Sunday School and are looking for a volunteer to assist with music.

The upcoming Tailgate Event is planned for October 15th from 3-6pm. In addition to the Tailgate Event, an Advent Event and Fat Tuesday Event are planned. A member suggested a monthly event, possibly in the winter months, to gather kids and families for a craft or event of some kind. The group is open to ideas. Confirmation classes are set to begin on September 13th. The next meeting is September 7th at 430pm.

Fellowship and Caring.

Jody Ziemann reported that summer fellowship ran smoothly, noting some issues with duplication of foods at times. New Member Class will be formed in October, Pastor, Tricia and De Anna will coordinate the formation of the class. Tricia is coordinating homebound visitations. Barb Tollaksen will be moving in September and was recognized for her years of service at the Salad Supper last week. Our group will provide fellowship following Ecumenical Service on 11.21.23. Next meeting date is 9.10.23, following service.

Worship and Music.

Gene Hess reported that Choir Practice begins August 23rd at 7pm. A tentative Choir schedule is set-up through the end of the year. A tentative Cantata date is set for December 17th. Jessica will work on a schedule for the Praise Team to sing on Sundays that the Choir does not sing. Communion Set-Up/ Guild is in need of more assistance, as we will need two assistants every Sunday. Council suggested a shout out to the congregation for the need of assistants. Gene inquired about Ken and his weekly altar and communion duties, Sandy reported that Ken is good with his Sunday duties. Upcoming special events include; Polka Sunday, Drawn to the Word, and tentative Cantata. Next meeting date is 10.4.23 following choir rehearsal.

Mission and Outreach.

Craig Chovanec reported that July's Mission Cause was the Berlin Food Pantry. A total of \$404.00 was given and sent to the food pantry. The group decided to designate the first Sunday of each month as Food Pantry Sunday, encouraging members to bring canned goods to put in the shopping cart in the Narthex. The August Mission Cause is the Christian Fellowship at UW-Oshkosh. Craig informed the council that Paige Soper, who spoke this past Sunday, is a major part of this growing ministry. Paige reported that she has been involved with the organization for the past 4 years and is continuing her work. She reported that student participation has doubled in size during her time there and that new attendance records have been set. Paige currently mentors students and leads weekly small groups, as well as taking advantage of outreach opportunities and mission trips. Craig also reported that her work is very important, as the youth of today will become the leaders of our church tomorrow.

Motion to adjourn the meeting by Jody Ziemann, seconded by Cindy Wallace, motion carried.

Our congregation has a constitution, that in addition to the Bible, serves to guide our life together as a church. This constitution reflects the theology and polity of this church as it organizes itself to preach the gospel of Jesus Christ, share the sacraments, reach out to the neighbor with good news, and share the love of God in the world. Each month we plan to highlight a part of our constitution. The full constitution is found under resources on the website.

Chapter 12 of the constitution outlines the role and responsibility of the church council.

C12.01.A21 Election to a Congregation Council carries with it the respect and trust of the constituency of your congregation. The value of your willingness to make a contribution to the life of your congregation is significant and appreciated. Your contribution involves your time, expertise, enthusiasm and energy. Saying yes to this responsibility brings some basic duties.

Congregation Council Member

- 1. Be a member in good standing of the congregation, regularly attending worship services and involved in congregational life.
- 2. Attend all meetings of the council.
- 3. Attempt to discover, through prayer and discernment, what is best for the congregation.
- 4. Consider the well-being of the council when dealing with specific issues and ministries.
- 5. Treat all matters relating to council deliberations as confidential, until such time as the information is determined a matter of public record.
- 6. Assist the pastor in nurturing the spiritual life of the congregation.
- 7. Care for the congregation's membership.
- 8. Ensure that the decisions of the congregation are carried out.
- 9. Be a part of a united body by supporting all decisions of the council, even if you don't agree with the decision.
- 10. Treat members of the council and staff as brothers and sisters in Christ.
- 11. Be familiar with the governing documents of the congregation.
- 12. Be a leadership presence in the congregation.
