

Grace Lutheran's Mission: We Gather to Worship, Grow, Care, and Share "All Are Welcome In This Place"

From the Pastor:

<u>Psalm 100 - A psalm of thanksgiving</u>. Make a joyful noise to the LORD, all the earth. Serve the LORD with gladness; come into his presence with singing. Know that the LORD is God. It is he who made us, and we are his; we are his people and the sheep of his pasture. Enter his gates with thanksgiving and his courts with praise. Give thanks to him; bless his name. For the LORD is good; his steadfast love endures forever and his faithfulness to all generations.



The superscription of the psalm says "A Psalm of Thanksgiving." This psalm helps us to see that Thanksgiving is more than just a holiday we observe on the fourth Thursday of November. The idea of thankfulness covers all of life. It is our way of approaching the world and the attitudes with which we choose to live.

"Enter his gates with thanksgiving." But what does that mean? Do we come to church with grateful hearts? Well, of course, we do. But more than that, we pass through every door with gratitude in our minds and hearts. We enter our own homes, grateful for the family of which we are a part. We go out into the world grateful for the abundance we take for granted way too often. We encounter others and give thanks for the gift of life that they are, even the ones we sometimes struggle to get along with.

"Make a joyful noise to the LORD, all the earth." This isn't about singing songs. Or maybe it is, but our songs may be spoken as well as sung. We are using our presence to bring joy into the world around us. And it only takes a quick look around to see how countercultural such an idea really is. We are called to worship the Lord with gladness. But the word translated as worship does not mean a worship service; it means a worship-centered life. Yes, what we do in the hour we gather with the body in the sanctuary of the church matters, and we ought to do it with as much gratitude and joy as we can muster. But to "worship the Lord with gladness" is what we do in our homes and places of work, in our neighborhoods, and on our playgrounds. We live out the worship of God by giving thanks anywhere and everywhere we can. As noisily as possible.

There are imperatives throughout this short psalm. Worship! Enter! Give thanks! Make a joyful noise! But there is one in the middle that looks different. *Know*. There are lots of things that we can do and need to do. But we are also commanded by the psalmist to *know*. There is something driving all that doing; there is something behind this joyful gratitude. We know that the Lord is God. Look at how the verse describes that knowing: "It is he who made us, and we are his." The pronouns for God surround the pronouns for us and then are repeated: "We are his people, and the sheep of his pasture." It is this boundedness of our lives in God that brings forth the gratitude we are invited to express with joy. We have been gathered up; we belong; we are a part of something that is infinitely bigger than we can see. Of course, gratitude is the only proper response. Especially when the psalm concludes with a description of this God who has gathered us. The Lord is good; God's steadfast love endures forever, and God's faithfulness to all generations.

President Heidi called meeting to order. Vice President De Anna Lueptow provided opening prayer

Approval of Agenda. Motion made by Cindy Wallace to approve the agenda as written, seconded by Sue Shemanski, motion carried.

Concerns from the audience. None.

Secretary's Report. Secretary's report circulated via email, one correction made. Motion made by Sue Shemanski to accept the report as written, seconded by Cindy Wallace, motion carried.

Treasurer's Report. Printed reports of treasurer's report, check detail and investment profile provided, reviewed and questions answered. Motion made by Sue Shemanski to accept the reports as written, seconded by Gene Hess, motion carried.

Unfinished Business.

Drawn to the Word Joint Service 9.24.23 at 10:00 am.

The building of the canvas has been completed by Bill Bartlett and Barb Bellmer. Potluck is planned. Heidi will request help from the Fellowship and Caring committee to set up on the Saturday prior to the event. No permits are needed for the selling of additional items by artist Paul Oman.

Ecumenical Service on 11.21.23 at 7:00 pm.

Churches included in this service will be the Methodist and River Shores. The Fellowship and Caring committee will provide fellowship following.

Shared Ministry Covenant. Tabled until December Joint Council meeting.

Winter Bingo. Committee will be formed to plan for the upcoming event.

New Business.

Executive Member Joint Council Meeting is 9.18.23 at Grace starting at 6:30 pm.

Discussion on ideas of extending Soul Food type events to possibly attract more families to Grace.

Bob Prellwitz presented an idea to be held on Friday October 13th prior to the football game vs Ripon. Upon much discussion, a motion was made by Bob Prellwitz to plan the event, seconded by Sue Shemanski, motion carried. The event, entitled Soul Food Supper will be planned for Friday October 13th from 5:00-6:30 pm. Activities being planned include a light meal and interactive games for youth middle school and older. Discussion on the cost for the event, financial and budgeted items reviewed. Jody will contact the school for advertising. Motion made by Gene Hess to utilize money from Vacation Bible School finances to finance this event, seconded by DeAnna Lueptow, motion carried. A committee will be formed.

Holy Conversations Document.

Discussion held on the Holy Conversations questionnaire and subsequent reflective question, Where is your congregation afraid? Discussion included fear of lack of youth members, our aged congregational membership and finances. Discussion also included additional activities and events to promote our church. Members will continue conversations at further meetings.

Terrorism Risk Insurance.

Discussion held on a proposal from Church Mutual Insurance Company for an additional premium cost for acts of terrorism. Motion made by Sue Shemanski to pay the additional \$59.00/year premium, seconded by Jody Ziemann, motion carried.

Puppet Service.

Gene Hess shared in depth information about the Scott Street Puppet Ministry. The group originates from Ripon, has an extensive group of dedicated members with up to 20 puppeteers. A service is planned for the Scott Street Puppet Ministry on 1.28.24. Members will discuss a possible joint service with First Lutheran for the event.

Absentee Members.

Discussion held on council members contacting absentee members, inviting them to the Drawn to the Word Service on 9.24.23, and to request updated contact information. Council members agreed to contact absentee members once the list is available.

Roy Chadwick Memorial Plaque.

Discussion held on a plaque to be placed by the donated tree. This will be tabled until the October meeting to provide time to research the style of the plaque and where to purchase the plaque.

Committee Reports.

Pastor's Report. Pastor Rebekah reported on Official Acts and ongoing activities at both Grace and First Lutheran. Official Acts included; Funeral Services for Lucy Leach and Roy Chadwick. Baptismal Service for Hudson Murkley. Visitations to June Lubbert and Jim and Georgia Lee Laird.

Ongoing activities at Grace included; preparing Sunday sermons, writing an article for the newsletter, and meeting weekly with staff. Met with the Mutual Ministry Committee, the Christian Educational Committee, met with a family about Baptism, the Berlin Pastors and Synod Zoom meeting for pastors. Worked with the Drawn to the Word planning team, worked with Penny to take over posts for the Facebook page, and helped with Soul Food.

Building and Grounds. Bob Prellwitz reported on the continued maintenance of the lawn and shrubs. The new Autumn Blaze maple tree, in memory of Roy Chadwick, has been planted. The doors have been repaired and painted. Future projects include touch-up painting in hallways, top dressing of lawn and lawn cleanup. Next meeting is 10.9.23 at 6:00 pm.

Christian Education. Sue Shemanski reported that the group met 9.7.23 to finalize Sunday School plans and the October 15th Tailgate Party. She reported that Sunday School started yesterday, with kids ranging from age 4 to 11, the group also hosted fellowship following service. The October 15th Tailgate Party will run from 3-6pm. From 3-5pm a variety of activities are being planned including; refreshments and popcorn, pumpkin bowling, ring toss, corn hole, a selfie booth, and prizes. The last hour of the event will include a devotion and a grilled

tailgate meal. A sign-up sheet will be posted on the kiosk. Sue also reported that Pastor shared the Synod Youth activities for the upcoming year. She reported that the group has discussed planning some of their own activities and possibly participating in some of the Synod activities. She also discussed inviting youth that attend Soul Food to these possible activities. Pastor provided the group a booklet of Advent activity ideas. They will host an Advent family activity night including a meal on November 29th, more information to come! Next meeting is 10.9.23 at 4:30 pm.

Fellowship and Caring. Jody Ziemann reported that the group has not met in person since the last council meeting. The group is planning for fellowship following the Ecumenical Service on 11.21.23. They are also looking to complete a shut-in activity in the future.

Worship and Music. Gene Hess reported that the group has not met since the last council meeting. He reported that Jeremy and Jess have the weekly music organized through the end of the year, including the Cantata which the choir has started rehearsing. The next meeting is 10.4.23, following choir rehearsal.

Mission and Outreach. Craig Chovanec provided a report regarding the September Mission, 'Funds for Leaders'. Craig wrote that the ELCA Funds for Leaders scholarship program supports students attending seminaries. By making seminaries more affordable the ELCA enables more future ministers to graduate with less debt, empowering those who God called into ministry to and serve as the church needs and the Holy Spirit leads. Funds for Leaders has been offering scholarships for students at ELCA seminaries who are pursuing rostered ministry in the ELCA since 2000. Last year alone the Fund provided over \$3.4 million in scholarships to 375 students. We are the church and each of us has a unique role to play in furthering the mission and ministry of our church. Your gift to Funds for Leaders ensures that highly talented individuals will be able to answer the call to leadership for this church and for our future. Pastor Rebekah also conveyed that Craig suggested bringing one food item for the food pantry, in hopes of increasing the collection for the food pantry. Discussion also held on collecting food items for the pantry at our Ecumenical Service on 11.21.23 and a 'Souper Bowl Sunday' collection in 2024.

Meeting adjourned.

Pastor Rebekah led the closing prayer.

Our congregation has a constitution, that in addition to the Bible, serves to guide our life together as a church. This constitution reflects the theology and polity of this church as it organizes itself to preach the gospel of Jesus Christ, share the sacraments, reach out to the neighbor with good news, and share the love of God in the world. Each month we plan to highlight a part of our constitution. The full constitution is found under resources on the website.

- C12.04. The Congregation Council shall have general oversight of the life and activities of this congregation and in particular its worship life, to the end that everything be done in accordance with the Word of God and the faith and practice of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America. The duties of the Congregation Council shall include the following:
 - a. To lead this congregation in stating its mission, to do long-range planning, to set goals and priorities, and to evaluate its activities in light of its mission and goals.
 - b. To seek to involve all members of this congregation in worship, learning, witness, service, and support.
 - c. To oversee and provide for the administration of this congregation to enable it to fulfill its functions and perform its mission.
 - d. To maintain supportive relationships with the rostered minister(s) and staff and help them annually to evaluate the fulfillment of their calling or employment.
 - e. To be examples individually and corporately of the style of life and ministry expected of all baptized persons.
 - f. To promote a congregational climate of peace and goodwill and, as differences and conflicts arise, to endeavor to foster mutual understanding.
 - g. To arrange for pastoral service during the sickness or absence of the pastor.
 - h. To emphasize support of the synod and churchwide organization of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America as well as cooperation with other congregations, both Lutheran and non-Lutheran, subject to established policies of the synod and the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America.
 - i. To recommend and encourage the use of program resources produced or approved by the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America.
 - j. To seek out and encourage qualified persons to prepare for the ministry of the Gospel.
