

From the Pastor:

Jesus: ⁴⁰ Anyone who welcomes you welcomes Me, and anyone who welcomes Me welcomes the One who sent Me. ⁴¹ Anyone who welcomes a prophet and surrenders to his prophecy will receive a prophet's reward, and anyone who welcomes a righteous person and conforms to the righteousness that surrounds him and proceeds from him will receive a righteous man's reward. ⁴² And anyone who has given so much as a cup of cold water to one of the little ones, because he is My disciple, I tell you, that person will be well rewarded. (Matthew 10:40-42)



A cup of cold water. It's such a simple thing. Yet, it's something I realize I often take for granted. I can walk into the kitchen open the tap and get a cup of water to quench my thirst. But can you imagine not having access to water?

When I was in seminary, I had the opportunity to travel to Ethiopia for a cross-cultural learning experience. Talk about culture shock! As we traveled around the country and observed how people lived, many of the Bible stories became more real to me. For example, the story of the woman at the well who had to go to a well each day to collect water for the household to use became more real to me as I observed people who had to walk to a water source to obtain water for their family each day. There are no kitchen taps to provide water, only the water carried home from the well. In some of the villages, there were actual wells where they could collect water. But more often, the people in villages had to travel sometimes miles to collect water for the family each day and the source of water they collected from looks more like the pond out in the pasture or even a mud hole. I admit I gagged when I saw some of the water sources people had to use to stay alive.

Fortunately, there are organizations like ELCA World Hunger that are working to help provide access to safe water. One of the villages I visited in Ethiopia was celebrating a brand new well. Those who went to collect water sang songs of joy and praise for the gift of the well and the refreshing water it provides. Having a well meant they now had access to clean water that was safe to drink.

The lack of access to safe water is one of the biggest challenges to overcoming poverty. It's also one of the most powerful opportunities to create change. With a well, spring box, or water point, as many as 500 families gain access to clean, safe water. Communities are healthier. People spend less money on medical expenses and more on food and education. And instead of spending hours each day gathering water for the family, women and children have time for work and school. Talk about a future filled with hope!

The mission for this month is the ELCA World Hunger Good Gifts. One of the Good Gifts options is A Simple Water Well. The cost for one well is \$2500. At the April council meeting, a letter from a congregation member was read that suggested an idea for the congregation could be collecting loose change and found coins and use them towards a mission. The council seemed to think this was a good idea, but we didn't make any plans. In the same week, the church council at First Lutheran set a goal to raise funds to purchase A Simple Water Well through the ELCA World Hunger Good Gifts. I'd like to propose that in addition to regular mission giving, we collect those loose coins and any found money and also put it towards A Simple Water Well. I think I will probably find several coins when I clean out my car from the winter and do some spring clean at home, and I will gladly give those towards a well so that we can give a cup of cold water in the name of Jesus to those who desperately need it. I hope you will join me in this project. Look for the glass jar in the narthex starting in May and add your found coins.

REGULAR GRACE ENGLISH LUTHERAN CHURCH CONGREGATIONAL COUNCIL MEETING – FELLOWSHIP HALL Monday, March 8, 2021

Present: Bill Bartlett, Karen Macaulay, Cindy Wallace, Matt Dretske, Tricia Prellwitz, Linda Reetz, Becky Guden, Conrad Falk, Pastor Rebekah Tarras. Sue Shemanski was absent.

President Bill Bartlett called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. and Vice President Linda Reetz led us in opening devotion and prayer.

The February Council minutes were presented. Cindy Wallace made a motion to accept the minutes with Matt Dretske seconding the motion. Motion approved.

Ministry Reports:

Pastor Rebekah reported she had 1 Baptism in February with possibly 2 more in April. She attended a synod conference meeting via zoom in the past month and has been busy implementing the Lenten services leading up to Holy Week.

Bill Bartlett gave a brief Investment summary on the three accounts with RBC. He noted that the Jones and General Fund investments had a decline but the Endowment investment had increased; so overall it leveled out to be a steady portfolio.

Cindy Wallace presented the February Treasurer's Report and noted the loss under the General Fund was due to the down payments for the cabinetry and technology projects. Karen Macaulay made a motion to accept the Treasurer's Report as presented; Tricia Prellwitz seconded. Motion approved. The February Check Detail was reviewed and with no questions Matt Dretske made a motion to approve checks as written; Karen Macaulay seconded. Motion approved.

Matt Dretske handed out the updated list of Buildings & Grounds projects and noted several projects that have been either completed or currently being worked on. He has received quotes for new entry way mats; thermostats have been replaced; the heaters in the entryway do not work so has contacted an electrician to check them out; has requested Evans Cabinetry to recalk countertops in the kitchen and is checking into Marty's Blue Sky Nursery for a price to come in with a roller to even off the lawn.

Conrad Falk reported on the Mission & Outreach Committee that he had requested to sit on in the Mission Committee meeting as the council liaison. Craig Chovanec agreed to provide a summary of the meeting to him for review and bring to council.

Karen Macaulay reported from the Fellowship & Caring Committee that she has 2 more members and will start meeting as a committee now.

Tricia Prellwitz handed out her report from the Worship & Music Committee indicating Jessica Fritz is working on Holy Week and would like to be included in any discussion regarding a timeline to start singing in church. Jeremy Fritz also is working on Holy Week with the Handbell Choir to perform on Easter Sunday. As with Jess, he would also like to be included on any discussion of singing again and when it will be safe to resume normal practices. Tricia reported that an average attendance on for a Sunday Service for in-person worship is between 45-55 people with over 200 viewing the service online. Lenten Services for in-person averages around 30 in attendance. The Women of Grace is coordinating the Lily Garden for Easter Sunday.

Meeting was then opened up to the audience and no one had concerns to bring to the council.

Old Business:

Bill Bartlett advised the Leonard Jones Checking Account at Farmers & Merchants Bank has now been closed and money was transferred to the General Fund Checking Account at Fortifi Bank. Also, the lockbox at Farmers & Merchants Bank has been cancelled.

Bill Bartlett asked for an update on the 2021 Giving Envelopes that have not been picked up. Sandy Peschke advised that some have been picked in the past month and the quantity ordered will be reduced for the 2022 order of envelopes.

New Business:

Bill Bartlett advised that he has been in contact with the synod Bishop regarding the installation of Pastor Rebekah. The Bishop advised this is not a requirement but if we chose to have it, she recommended an outdoor service possibly in June which would be a separate service from our regular Sunday service. Pastor Rebekah felt it was not necessary, so after discussion Linda Reetz made a motion to have a Thank You Celebration in lieu of a formal installation this summer; Cindy Wallace seconded. Motion approved.

Pastor Rebekah advised she will be gone on Sunday, May 16 and needed direction whether to get a supply pastor or we would do "Service of the Word". After discussion, the council advised Tricia Prellwitz to work with Jessica Fritz in having the "Service of the Word" and not hire a supply pastor.

An updated Member Directory which would contain member pictures was brought up. It has been over 10 years since we had one and Pastor would find it beneficial. Pastor advised there were 3 options which a professional photography company would come in; members submit their own photo to be downloaded in the church's database through Servant Keeper software; or use Instant Directory website and we still do our own printing. After discussion, council decided to do our own directory and Becky Guden will help the office look into how to do it through Servant Keeper.

Bill Bartlett requested representatives to attend the Synod Assembly May 14-15 via Zoom. The conference runs 4:30 to 8:30pm on Friday, May 14; 8:00am to 5:00pm on Saturday, May; with a 10:30 service on Sunday. This request will be put out to the congregation to see if anyone is interested in participating via online only.

The criteria for COVID policy and procedures were reviewed. Bill Bartlett has talked with the county nurse and even though the Green Lake County numbers are low, she advises to stay with current practices. Events like hosting Men's Breakfast and Fellowship were reviewed; and Pastor Rebekah reported on responses she received from area churches on what they were doing. Council decided to keep our current procedures to be safe with this topic being reviewed monthly by the council.

Pastor Rebekah advised of possible changes that may be happening in the altar décor once the screens are installed. We may have to move our candelabras and flags to accommodate the new technology so will be looking for recommendations.

As other concerns, Bill Bartlett advised he was looking for one volunteer to help host a dinner for the High School members on March 21. His wife, Sue, will make the dinner but would like help. Tricia Prellwitz and Linda Reetz advised they would help. Also, Bill wanted to remind the council of the Bloodmobile the next day, March 9, and they will be using the Fellowship Hall for blood draws.

Pastor Rebekah led us in Closing Prayer.

Tricia made a motion to adjourn; Conrad Falk seconded. Motion approved. Meeting adjourned at 8:10 pm.


