Grace Lutheran's Mission: We Gather to Worship, Grow, Care, and Share "All Are Welcome In This Place"

From the Pastor:

One of my favorite books in the Bible is the book of Ephesians. It is a treasure trove of wisdom, encouragement, and guidance that speaks powerfully to us today, just as it did to the early Christians in Ephesus.



Ephesians begins with an exploration of the spiritual blessings we have in Christ (Ephesians 1:3-14). Paul reminds us that we are chosen and redeemed by God's grace. He highlights the immeasurable love God has for us, a love that predates the foundation of the world. In these verses, we are reminded of our identity in Christ – an identity rooted in grace, love, and divine purpose.

One of the central themes of Ephesians is unity. Paul speaks of the unity of the church, a body of believers from diverse backgrounds and cultures, all brought together through Christ (Ephesians 2:11-22). This unity is not merely a call to coexist peacefully but to actively love, support, and grow with one another. It is a call to break down barriers and build bridges, reflecting the reconciliation we have received through Jesus.

In Ephesians 4:1-16, Paul shifts his focus to the practical outworking of this unity. He urges us to live a life worthy of our calling, characterized by humility, gentleness, patience, and love. He speaks of the diversity of gifts within the body of Christ, each one given for the building up of the church. This diversity should not lead to division but to a richer, more vibrant community where each member contributes to the growth and health of the whole.

Paul also provides clear guidance on how to live out our faith in everyday life. In Ephesians 5:1-21, he exhorts us to be imitators of God. He gives practical advice for relationships – between husbands and wives, parents and children, and masters and slaves – emphasizing mutual respect, love, and submission (Ephesians 5:22-6:9). These teachings remind us that our faith should permeate every aspect of our lives, transforming our relationships and interactions with others.

As we navigate the spiritual battles of life, Paul explains how we are equipped with the armor of God (Ephesians 6:10-18). He describes the full armor we need to stand firm against the schemes of the devil: the belt of truth, the breastplate of righteousness, the shoes of the gospel of peace, the shield of faith, the helmet of salvation, and the sword of the Spirit. This vivid imagery underscores the reality of spiritual warfare and the divine protection and empowerment we have in Christ.

We will hear readings from Ephesians throughout July and August. I encourage you to delve deeply into this book. Reflect on its teachings, meditate on its truths, and allow it to transform your heart and mind. Let us strive to embody the unity, love, and purity that Paul speaks of, building a community that reflects the glory of God.

GRACE LUTHERAN CHURCH COUNCIL MEETING 4.8.2024

President Linda called the meeting to order at 6:58pm.

Council members present; Pastor Rebekah, Linda Reetz, Terry Wallace, Sandy Peschke, Becky Olsen, Bob Prellwitz, Anita Lind, Craig Chovanec, Jody Ziemann, Mary Gropp. Congregation member present, Jean Dretske.

Opening Devotion. Provided by Terry Wallace.

Audience Remarks. None.

Secretary's Report. April meeting minutes circulated via email, amendments made. Motion made by Craig to accept report with amendments, seconded by Sandy, motion carried. Brief discussion on ensuring all members are receiving the report via accurate email addresses.

Treasurer's Report. April's report including check details provided. Question asked regarding the Church Mutual Insurance. Sandy will send out an email with details on the insurance. Motion made by Anita to accept the report, seconded by Bob, motion carried.

President's Report. Scholarship Committee. Bonnie Kline will serve as the new member of this committee. 2025 Bingo. The 2024 Bingo committee members are willing to serve again for the 2025 event.

Pastor's Report. Report included Official Acts of the funeral for Bill Huck and visitation to Cheryl Chappa. Pastor provided a list of many ongoing activities and meetings. Two of those meetings included the Berlin Food Pantry Annual Meeting, (serving as a board member), and the Winnebago Housing Coalition, Green Lake County Subcommittee. Pastor reported that the food pantry has had a 20% increase in their clients since 2022 and a 41% increase in the pounds of food and grocery items dispersed since 2022. In addition to the financial support and inkind donations, the pantry is in need of additional volunteers. Volunteers are needed to help with food distribution and to serve in leadership roles on the board of directors. The Winnebago Housing Coalition's goal is to bring awareness to the homeless and housing issues in Green Lake County. The group is in the process of gathering data on the homeless in our area and potentially having an emergency shelter during cold weather months. If anyone is interested in serving on this committee or serving the food pantry contact Pastor Rebekah.

Committee Reports.

Investment Committee. Jean Dretske provided a detailed report of our current investment profile. She informed the council that the committee continues to review current investments to ensure we are maximizing our investments. The next meeting of the group will be at the end of June.

Fellowship and Caring. Jody Ziemann reported the committee reviewed and made changes for the 2025 Palm Sunday Brunch. Potential future plans include a shut-in project, a Halloween Hallway, a Puzzle Saturday, and serving of food at a local craft fair. Next meeting 6.9.24.

Buildings and Grounds. Bob Prellwitz reported that outside grounds maintenance continues, members will spot clean the pew cushions and discussion continues on parking lot options. The group is creating a safety plan for the church and is creating a five year plan on the possible replacing of large appliances. Next meeting is 6.10.24 **Christian Education.** Anita Lind reported that the committee met in April, discussed developing a policy for the current 'Youth Fund', planned for the last day of Sunday School, hosting fellowship that day and planned for a Mother's Day project for Sunday School kids. There are 2-3 possible summer camp attendees, families will be reimbursed for ½ the cost of camp. The committee will host and serve cake for Fellowship on Graduation Sunday 5.26.24, there are two graduating seniors this year. Next meeting to be announced.

Worship and Music. Mary Gropp reported no needs and no written report.

Mission and Outreach. Craig Chovanec reported that the Ma y Mission is the Compassion Child, the organization has existed for 72 years. The program focuses on education, religious training, medical care and employment assistance. We currently support two boys until they reach adulthood, Kelly in West Africa and

Bryan in El Salvador. Each boy spends a good amount of time at their learning centers and are thriving in their impoverished environments because of our financial and spiritual support. Letters received show their gratitude and happiness. We at Grace are making a huge difference in their lives.

Finance Committee. Terry Wallace reported the group met on 4.23.24. They reviewed the purpose and functions of the committee as written in the constitution, reviewed the Leonard Jones Fund, and the General Investment Fund history. Discussed the possible renaming of the General Fund to the Capitol Improvement Fund and possible ways to generate more income. Next meeting date is 7.23.24.

Unfinished Business.

Executive Committee Language. The purpose and functions of the Executive Committee were read for a second time. Motion made by Craig to adopt the language for the Continuing Resolution C13.01.A24, seconded by Terry, motion carried.

Shared Covenant. Discussion held on the need to plan a meeting date now that the finance committee has met and per the every 6 month review as written in the Shared Covenant guidelines. Linda will contact Mark Henn for possible meeting dates.

New Business.

Christian Education. Discussion held on the new language for the Christian Education Committee, C13.10.A24. This is the first reading of the new language with no action taken at this meeting. This item will be added to the June agenda for possible approval. Discussion held on changing the 'Youth Fund & Faith Formation Fund' to the 'Christian Education Fund'. Motion made by Anita to make this change, seconded by Terry, motion carried.

Deaf Community Request. Discussion held on a request to add a second Sunday of Signing each month. Sara has agreed to a trial of Signing twice a month during the summer months. Motion made by Terry Wallace to add a second Sunday of Signing each month during the summer months, seconded by Jody Ziemann, motion carried.

Rolland Bahr Bequest. Grace has received a \$16,390 bequest in honor of Rollie, from family and friends. Pastor reported that they did not have a request of how the bequest was to be utilized. Motion made by Jody Ziemann to place the bequest in the General Investment Fund, seconded by Bob Prellwitz. Following further discussion Jody rescinded the original motion. Motion made by Jody Ziemann to place the bequest into the Memorial Fund, seconded by Mary Gropp, motion carried.

Consultant's Report. Discussion held on the report. Council Retreat with Cathy Cowling is planned for 6.5.24.

Closing Prayer. Given by Pastor Rebekah.

Adjournment. Motion made by Craig to adjourn, seconded by Anita, motion carried, meeting adjourned at 8:35pm.

Constitution Corner

Our congregation has a constitution, that in addition to the Bible, serves to guide our life together as a church. This constitution reflects the theology and polity of this church as it organizes itself to preach the gospel of Jesus Christ, share the sacraments, reach out to the neighbor with good news, and share the love of God in the world. Each month we plan to highlight a part of our constitution. The entire constitution is found under resources on the website.

Chapter six of the Constitution explains our affiliation with the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) and the East Central Synod of Wisconsin. Each congregation is considered an interdependent part of the ELCA. We accept the Confession of Faith and agree to the purposes of the ELCA.

Each congregation is independently responsible for its life as a Christian community. However, we are better together and recognize that our life and mission are enhanced by being part of the larger church. As part of the ELCA, we pledge financial support and participation in the life and mission of the larger church both at the synod level and the churchwide level. We agree to call pastoral leadership from the roster of Ministers of Word and Sacrament of the ELCA and follow the call procedures of the ELCA. This chapter also provides guidance on relocation, partnerships, developing additional ministry sites, and seeking assistance from the synodical bishop when needed.
