

Letter From the Pastor:

We've entered the season after Pentecost, also called Ordinary Time in the church year. While the name might sound simple, this season is anything but ordinary! Ordinary Time is a time of growth, reflection, and deepening our faith. It's the longest stretch of the church year, offering us the chance to live out our discipleship in everyday life, not in a rush to the next festival or major celebration. Unlike the high points of Advent, Christmas, Lent, and Easter, Ordinary Time is a time to focus



on how we live out our faith day by day. This is the season where we listen to God's voice through the scriptures and allow that Word to shape our daily walk with Christ.

This year, we continue to use the semi-continuous lectionary readings, which give us the opportunity to journey more chronologically through the books of the Old Testament. Our readings this year will be on the prophets, whose voices still have plenty to say to us today.

So, who are the prophets, and why should we care about them?

Prophets were people chosen by God to speak a message from God. It might be a call to repentance, a promise of hope, or a challenge to injustice. They didn't mince words. These messengers reminded people to live in line with God's will, and they weren't afraid to call out wrongs when they saw them. While some prophets foretold future events, their main focus was calling people back to faithful living.

In the coming weeks, we'll hear about prophets like Elijah, Amos, Hosea, Isaiah, and Jeremiah. These readings will challenge us, comfort us, and remind us of what it looks like to walk humbly with God, love mercy, and do justice. Their messages are far from outdated. They speak to issues like justice, mercy, and faithfulness that are just as relevant today as they were thousands of years ago.

In a world that feels chaotic and divided, where headlines can overwhelm us and make it hard to know what's true, the prophets invite us to pause, listen, and reflect. Their words remind us that God's justice and mercy are bigger than our fears. They challenge us to hold on to hope, and to act with love and integrity even when the world feels like it's falling apart.

And through it all, we remember Jesus, the ultimate fulfillment of God's promises. Jesus didn't shy away from the chaos of his time. He walked right into it, healing, teaching, and ultimately laying down his life to show us the depth of God's love. He is the prophet who speaks truth not just in words, but in the very actions of his life. And it's through Jesus that we find the strength to keep living faithfully, even in the midst of uncertainty and fear.

As we journey through this season of Ordinary Time, let's listen closely to the voices of the prophets and let them shape how we live and love in today's world, following the example of Jesus who calls us to be peacemakers, justice-seekers, and bearers of hope.

Secretary's Report – Anita moved to approve as sent via email to members. Heidi seconded. Motion carried. Discussed if we need hard copies of the minutes at meetings and decided "No". Sandy keeps a hard copy in the binder in the office.

Treasurer's Report – Sandy has been learning how to put the RBC Auxiliary Account into Quik Books. The money was transferred from the General Checking to RBC at the beginning of April so this month's report shows less money in the General Account. Once Sandy learns and develops the Quik Book processes she can teach someone else so that she has back-up. Sue moved to approve the Treasurer's Report. Second by Bonnie. Motion carried.

- Pastor Pastor emailed her report to Council members prior to meeting. She has finished Confirmation and working on figuring out how she will do it next year as one student needs to do it virtually. She has worked out coverage for the services she will be on vacation this summer.
- Committees –

Fellowship and Caring – Next meeting June 8th. We discussed this group providing Fellowship for New Member Sunday on June 15.

Building and Grounds – Bob distributed a written report. Lawn care has begun and the roof above altar is being watched for leaks. The Roof Access hatch will be painted. Their next meeting is June 8 following the service.

Christian Education- last day of Sunday School was this past Sunday. Served ice cream for Fellowship. Will be helping to sponsor 3 kids at church camp this summer.

Worship and Music – Jess has the music covered for while she is on medical leave in June. The Choir's last performance was this past Sunday until Fall.

Mission and Outreach – This month's Mission is Vet's Roll and the Honor Flights. Penny Bahn presented regarding this at church this past Sunday. Tim Koch will be the new Council member leading this committee.

Finance Committee – Terry provided the minutes from the last Finance Committee Meeting instead of writing up a separate summary. One special meeting of the Finance Committee was held to discuss the need for a new stove in the kitchen and review quotes. We have 2 quotes, one for \$8675 from Krumenauer's and one for \$9087 from Moriarity's. The present stoves are over 60 years old and it was decided we should probably replace both at this time. Investment Committee – Written Report provided showing a small loss in April in our Investments, but growth overall in the last year.

Unfinished Business

- Outside The Box Outreach Committee- The Congregation approved using ½% of the 5 year average of the Leonard Jones Fund for community outreach. Heidi reported that the meetings have a lot of energy and participants are taking active roles in moving forward to look into purchasing snow pants and boots for kids for the Fall, among other plans. They are also working on developing a budget for the use of this money.
- Data Pro Computer Update -Sandy reported that they are still waiting for Jason to come back and complete the Networking and Data saving portion of installation of the new computer as his assistant did not know how when he came with the computer. Total cost so far is \$1390.
- Pastor's Upcoming Absences and Coverage All taken care of!
- Medical Leave Dates for Jess Having surgery June 3 and will be out a minimum of 2 weeks. Music is covered.
- Scholarship Committee- They have decided to invest this fund at RBC vs putting in a CD. They are expecting one more donation and then will move the funds.

New Business

- Stove/oven for kitchen The Finance Committee recommended replacing both ovens and capping the amount spent at \$12,000. Heidi moved to propose to the Congregation in a Special Congregational Meeting to be held on June 1st that we replace the two old ovens with one commercial 5 tray Convection oven and one commercial six burner stove with griddle, not to exceed a cost of \$12,000. Second by Sue. Motion carried. Heidi and Deanna will write an article for the Newsletter and to be emailed to members regarding the history and need for the new ovens. This will also describe the convection oven for those who don't know.
- New Council Member Approval Sue moved to accept Tim Koch as our new Council Member replacing Craig Chovanec until the end of his term in January 2026. Tim will also take over the duties of heading the Mission and Outreach Committee. Second by Bob. Motion Carried.
- New Members Anita moved to accept and approve five new members into our Congregation on June 15, 2025. Individuals requesting to become members are: Tom Zuhlke, Lisa Tagenhorst, Laurence and Kelly Thompson, and Jerry Weigand. Second by Bonnie. Motion Carried. AC

Synod Assembly Recap

On June 7, 2025 Linda Reetz and Terry Wallace attended the synod assembly at Calvary Lutheran Church, Green Bay as our congregation's representatives. The 2025 theme was To Serve All People Following the Example of Jesus. This annual meeting is where the business of the East Central Synod of Wisconsin is conducted.

272 people participated. Some of the breakdown included 180 lay people and 80 rostered ministers. The keynote speaker was Venice Williams, executive director of Milwaukee's

Alice's Garden. Her talk centered on things that blocked people in ministries and relationships. She then helped participants imagine how simple, but important, changes in personal relationships and ministries can make a difference.

Sherrill Kenzel of Meaningful Marks LLC worked to visually capture what was happening in the assembly through her live visual representations. Her drawings were captured in live time while the speakers and business of the assembly was happening.

As for business of the synod – the 2026 budget was approved, the 2026 minimum compensation guidelines were also okayed. There were also resolutions that were discussed and ultimately passed. Elections were held for officers, synod council members, and additional committee members.

Each year's offering is designated to various causes. This year participants saw their donations go to the Bishop's Resource Fund (provides emergency resources to rostered leaders and helps cover continuing education costs). Another portion of the offering went to AMMPARO(Accompanying Migrant Minors with Protection, Advocacy, Representation and Advocacy) which supports vulnerable children in migration.

Outside the Box Outreach Committee Update

At the recent congregation meeting, members approved the amount of \$6500.00 coming from the Leonard Jones fund to be used in a variety of ways supporting youth in the Berlin Area School District. Committee members have been gathering information to help in deciding which projects to tackle first.

There were a variety of reports given connected to potential projects:

- 1. Patti Batenhorst shared that Fleet Farm has an online donation request form to be used as the committee looks for potential funding sources for projects. Target marks down merchandise at the end of a season and returns the rest to headquarters. Kimberly Clark supports the Eastern Wisconsin Diaper bank. Volunteers package them up for distribution.
- 2. Jean Dretske talked with Mike Griffin, the head of Berlin Food Pantry. They do not distribute diapers. And, there is a possibility that the food pantry may have to limit how many times a family can access the site. Before COVID, 40 families were served per week. Now the number is 70 families per week the demand is more than the supply.
- 3. Madyson Main who is the Berlin Boys and Girls Club site coordinator shared with Jean that everything involving youth flows through the club. They prefer to not do the purchasing but would very much appreciate receiving goods.
- 4. Karen Schweigert spoke with the manager at Berlin Tractor Supply store. They have last year's boots in the back of the store. She will follow up to find out how many pairs they have and a potential price if the committee purchases large numbers of last year's leftovers.
- 5. Lands End has snow pants and boots at a reasonable price. They also have a donation program. Jean Dretske will try to get more information.

A tentative schedule for any disbursement and spending the approved money was decided as follows:

August - socks, underwear, personal hygiene products

September - snow pants, boots

October - cooking class and crock pots (Boys and Girls club would provide names of families to invite to the class)

November - gloves, scarves, mittens

December - cookie baking. Thrivent cards could be used for cooking and baking supplies.

A budget was also created in order to spend dollars effectively before the end of the year.

December/January - \$500.00


