

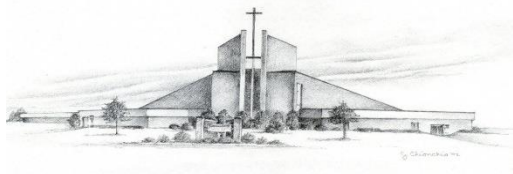

From the Pastor:



“So in everything, do to others what you would have them do to you, for this sums up the Law and the Prophets.” - Matthew 7:12

It feels as though our world is growing more divided by the day. Political, social, and cultural differences seem to drive us further apart, often leading to anger, frustration, and a lack of understanding. But as followers of Christ, we are called to live differently. Jesus commanded us to “love your neighbor as yourself” (Matthew 22:39). This “Golden Rule” seems even more relevant and urgent for our world today.

Loving our neighbor doesn’t mean we will always agree, but it does mean that we are called to treat one another with respect, grace, and compassion—no matter our differences. Jesus modeled this perfectly by ministering to people from all walks of life, including those who were often marginalized or viewed as enemies of the culture. His love transcended barriers, showing us that our common humanity outweighs any ideological or political divisions.

When Jesus said, “Do to others what you would have them do to you” (Matthew 7:12), He was inviting us into a way of life that values empathy, kindness, and understanding. This principle, often referred to as the Golden Rule, is not just a polite suggestion but a challenge to actively seek the well-being of others, even when it’s difficult. In a polarized environment, this can feel countercultural. It’s easier to retreat into our echo chambers, to avoid those who think differently, and to label others as “the opposition.” Yet, Jesus calls us to a higher standard—one that prioritizes love over division.

As the body of Christ, the Church has a unique opportunity to be a light in these divisive times. By embracing love for our neighbors, we can model a different way of being—a way that seeks reconciliation over hostility, dialogue over debate, and unity over discord. It’s important to remember that every person we encounter, regardless of political beliefs, is made in the image of God and is deeply loved by our Creator.

This doesn’t mean we ignore or suppress our convictions. Instead, it means we approach conversations and relationships with humility, curiosity, and a willingness to listen. We can stand firm in our values while still engaging others with love and respect. In doing so, we reflect the heart of Christ and build bridges where others might seek to build walls.

As we navigate this polarized landscape, especially in these weeks leading up to the elections, let us ask ourselves: How can I show love to my neighbor, especially when we disagree? How can I live out the Golden Rule in my daily interactions, both online and in person? These questions can help us cultivate a spirit of love that transcends division and embodies the Kingdom of God here on earth.

May we be known not by the sides we take, but by the love we give.

President Linda Reetz called the meeting to order at 6:56 pm.

Opening Devotion. Given by Terry Wallace.

Roll Call. Members present; Linda Reetz, Terry Wallace, Sandy Peschke, Becky Olsen, Pastor Rebekah, Craig Chovanec, Bob Prellwitz, and Heidi Schramer. Absent; Jody Ziemann and Anita Lind.

Approval of the Agenda. Linda added Joint Council gathering and Becky added Good Samaritan Fund to the Agenda. Motion made by Craig to approve the agenda with the additions, seconded by Bob, motion carried.

No audience.

Secretary's Report. July meeting minutes circulated via email. Motion made by Sandy to accept the report as written, seconded by Craig, motion carried.

Treasurer's Report. Sandy presented the July financial reports, including the check detail. Motion made by Terry to accept the reports as written, seconded by Craig, motion carried.

President's Report.

Time and Talent Sign Up. Linda informed the group that Terry and Pastor created a Time and Talent survey for members, tentatively planned for distribution in early October. This sign up is a means of how members can utilize their time and talents in serving the church and our community.

Funding Forward. The webinar learning sessions are planned for 9.16, 9.23, 9.30, and 10.7.24, starting at 6:30pm. All congregation members are invited to attend the learning sessions.

Conflict Ground Rules. Signed forms returned to members.

Joint Council Gathering. The gathering is planned and members attending were asked to sign up for food items.

Pastor's Report. Accomplishments included; a grant submission to the ELCA Disabilities ministry for additional funds for signing twice a month and an interpreter for Christian education events. She has finalized the confirmation schedule, is studying Ephesians for sermons and bible study, participated in the Global Leadership Summit, various meetings and church activities. Priorities for the next period include; sermon series plan for September, preparing for the Funding Forward course, and fall worship planning. Reported that she appreciated the sessions with Cathy Cowling and is planning a vacation day on Sunday, 10.6.24 to celebrate the 150th anniversary of St. John's Lutheran in Eau Claire. Pastor will reach out for Pastoral support for that day.

Committee Reports.

Buildings and Grounds. Bob reported that lawn, shrub and tree maintenance is ongoing. Carpet cleaning is completed in the fellowship hall. East hallway carpet cleaning was not completed, contact will be made with the cleaning company for completion. Oven grates are cleaned. New business included; questioning the need for a security system, questioned the replacement of the fellowship carpet with laminate, and the replacing of some of the old bushes. (Bob will donate the new plants needed) He also briefly reported on information regarding solar panels, he will gather more information. Next meeting 10.14.24.

Christian Education. No report. Pastor stated that Sunday School and Confirmation letters have been sent.

Fellowship and Caring. No report.

Worship and Music. Heidi reported that choir practice begins 8.21.24. The next meeting will be planned after choir practice start date.

Mission and Outreach. Craig reported the mission of the month is Christian Fellowship at UW Oshkosh. Paige Soper has graduated and is now serving as a full-time intern for Chi Alpha. The group has doubled in size in one year and set new attendance records for the fall and conferences. Paige serves as a mentor and disciple to students, leads weekly small groups, preaches sermons, attends mission trips, helps with large group services and outreach opportunities. Paige would appreciate your prayers for her campus missionary work, as well as any

monetary donation you are able to contribute. The youth of today will become the church leaders in the years to come.

Finance. Terry provided a written report from the committee. The committee will meet the 3rd Tuesday of the month at 1pm, next meeting 8.20.24.

Investment. No report. Linda will reach out to Jean Dretske for the monthly report.

Unfinished Business.

Investment Statement Policy. Second reading of the language completed. Motion made by Terry to accept the Investment Statement Policy as written, seconded by Craig, motion carried.

Polka Service and Pies. Event is 8.25.24. Council members will provide pies.

Memorial Fund Form. Revised form presented. Motion made by Bob to accept revised form, seconded by Craig, motion carried.

New Business.

Finance Committee language. Final language presented and reviewed. Motion made by Terry to accept the Finance Committee language as written, for the constitution, seconded by Sandy, motion carried. (Will be listed as C13.10.A24 in the constitution)

Signing. Discussion on having signing twice monthly through December 2024. Pastor reported that deaf members are very appreciative of signing twice a month. Motion made by Terry to offer signing twice monthly through December, seconded by Bob, motion carried.

Rolland Bahr Memorial. Discussion held on the bequest. Motion made by Terry to move the \$16,400 bequest into the Capitol Improvement Fund, seconded by Heidi, motion carried.

Undesignated Memorial Funds. Discussion held on the funds. Sandy will research these funds and present her findings at next month's meeting.

Council member's office terms. Discussion held on current council officer terms. No action taken.

Good Samaritan Fund. Becky discussed member's concerns with the recent elimination of the fund's guidelines. In addition, discussed the need for accountability and a paper trail for the yearly audit of this fund. A small group of members will meet and create a simplified guideline for this fund. The guidelines will be brought back to council for possible approval.

Closing Prayer. Given by Pastor Rebekah.

Adjournment. Motion made by Craig to adjourn, seconded by Bob, motion carried. Meeting adjourned at 8:19pm.

Constitution Corner

In our church constitution, chapter 3 explains the Nature of the Church. In the first provision of this chapter, it states “All power in the Church belongs to our Lord Jesus Christ, its head. All actions of this congregation are to be carried out under his rule and authority.”

This provision emphasizes that the Church is built on the foundation of Jesus Christ and rooted in the Word of God. The congregation’s mission is to respond to God’s call by proclaiming the gospel, serving others, and living in faithful witness.

This section of the constitution reminds us that our congregation is also part of a larger body, united in faith, purpose, and service. Rooted in Christ, we are called to live out our faith together, sharing the love of God with the world. As we embrace this, we embody the heart of our mission—reflecting Christ’s love through worship, service, and outreach.

Recap from Class 1 - Linda Reetz

A group of Grace Lutheran congregants has begun a class called **Funding Forward**. The class will help members understand why offerings and tithing no longer meet the needs for most of our congregations. The class also focuses on thinking outside the box when it comes to how a church building and its resources can be used. Since most church buildings sit empty numerous days each week, what are more creative ways to expand the use of a building and perhaps fill a need in the community or generate some revenue?

During the first session, the focus was on identifying at least ten assets our congregation possesses. There were four asset areas of finances, skills, time, network provided and the task was to determine what we have done in the past, continue to do, or may do in the future as it relates to those areas. 7. More people are worshipping online rather than in person.
8. An aging community can impact the amount of giving.
9. A core group does much of the work leading to burnout.
10. We have forgotten the history of this church and the hard work it has taken to get this far.
11. There used to be 2 services.

The class meets on Monday evenings beginning at 6:30 pm. It is not too late for anyone to join. The group has already discovered that with the varied perspectives and rich history within the participants, so many possibilities have already emerged.

“**Once Upon A Farm**” Through The Eyes Of A Wife by Lois Stark is the Grace Book Club’s choice for October.

The cow had died of milk fever. My husband was depressed. Later that day, in the spring of 1987, he talked with a neighbor who was also feeling helpless after not being able to save his top cow from the same misfortune. My husband instantly felt better, not because the neighbor’s cow died, but because he realized he was not in this alone. This led me to question how many other farmers needed to share. It prompted the start of the column, “The Farmer’s Wife,” which appeared in the *Berlin Journal Newspapers*.

Lois’s book contains essays of how farmers and their families were torn between technology and tradition, having a way of life and making a living, keeping their sons on the farm and giving them an “easier” way. The essays share the sorrows, fears, and frustrations, as well as the joys, satisfaction, and pride of farm life.

The pages of her book record and reflect on an era that is being destroyed by uncertainties and regulations, and by the ill-fated trend to expansion in pursuit of

better returns.
