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

Grace Lutheran's Mission: We Gather to Worship, Grow, Care, and Share "All Are Welcome In This Place" Dear Friends in Christ,

I saw a meme on social media the other day that said, "Grace is when you get the good things you don't deserve. Mercy is when you're spared from the bad things you do deserve. God is generous with both." I liked the simplicity of this explanation, but it left me pondering what the Bible says about God's mercy.

Here are a few Bible verses:

- For the Lord your God is gracious and merciful. If you return to him, he will not continue to turn his face from you. 2 Chronicles 30:9b
- Remember, O Lord, your compassion and unfailing love, which you have shown from long ages past. Do not remember the rebellious sins of my youth. Remember me in the light of your unfailing love, for you are merciful, O Lord. Psalm 25:6-7
- Have mercy on me, O God, because of your unfailing love. Because of your great compassion, blot out the stain of my sins. Wash me clean from my guilt. Purify me from my sin. Psalm 51:1-2
- So let us come boldly to the throne of our gracious God. There we will receive his mercy, and we will find grace to help us when we need it most. Hebrews 4:16
- But God is so rich in mercy, and he loved us so much, that even though we were dead because of our sins, he gave us life when he raised Christ from the dead. (It is only by God's grace that you have been saved!) Ephesians 2:4-5
- He saved us, not because of the righteous things we had done, but because of his mercy. He washed away our sins, giving us a new birth and new life through the Holy Spirit. Titus 3:5

Mercy is at the heart of who God is. It's God's compassion, patience, and love poured out even when we don't deserve it. We see it throughout Scripture—in God's forgiveness of wayward people, in Jesus healing the broken, and ultimately, in the cross, where Christ takes on what we deserve so that we might receive what we could never earn.

One of the most powerful illustrations of mercy is the parable of the prodigal son (Luke 15:11-32). A young man recklessly squanders his inheritance and finds himself destitute, ashamed, and desperate. Deciding to return home, he expects to be met with disappointment, maybe even rejection. But instead, his father sees him from a distance and runs to him—embracing him, restoring him, and celebrating his return. This is a picture of God's mercy. We don't get what we deserve; we receive love, forgiveness, and a fresh start.

Paul writes in Romans 12:1, "Therefore, I urge you, brothers and sisters, in view of God's mercy, to offer your bodies as a living sacrifice, holy and pleasing to God." When we truly see God's mercy—when we grasp how deeply loved and forgiven we are—it changes us. It moves us to live differently, to respond with gratitude, and to extend mercy to others.

This Lent, we will explore what it means to live "In View of God's Mercy" in our mid-week worship series. Each week, we will reflect on different aspects of God's mercy and how it transforms our faith and daily lives. I invite you to join us on this journey as we open our hearts to the incredible mercy of God—mercy that welcomes, restores, and renews.

COUNCIL MEETING 1.13.25

President Linda called the meeting to order.

Roll Call. Present; Linda Reetz, Terry Wallace, Becky Olsen, Jody Ziemann, Craig Chovanec, Bob Prellwitz, Anita Lind, Heidi Schramer, and Pastor Rebekah. Absent Sandy Peschke. No audience.

Opening Devotion. Terry provided.

Approval of the Agenda. Linda added Finance Committee Recommendation to New Business. Motion made by Anita to approve the agenda with the addition, seconded by Jody, agenda approved.

Audience Remarks. No audience remarks.

Secretary's Report. December meeting minutes read. One date correction was made. Motion made by Jody to approve minutes as read with the correction, seconded by Terry, motion carried.

Treasurer's Report. Sandy provided copies of the written reports. Motion made by Craig to accept report as provided, seconded by Bob, motion carried.

President's Report.

Medical Leave Update. Jess will be on leave 6.3.25-6.15.25.

Committee Reports for Annual Report. The Endowment Committee is meeting this week, all other committees have submitted their reports.

Listing any known prayer requests in the bulletin. Discussion held on returning to the practice of listing prayer requests in the weekly bulletins. Linda will ask for input from the congregation and bring results back to the council.

Pastor's Report.

Accomplishments/Activity Highlights. Visited most of the homebound members, studied and prepared sermons. Prepared and led weekly Bible tudy at First. Worked on preparations for the Christmas programs at both churches, conducted staff reviews with council presidents at both church attended the meeting of the Oshkosh Conference, attended various other meetings and church activities. Wrote letters for the Giving Statements and the Annual Reports.

Priorities for the next period. Congregational Annual Meetings, leading Bible studies on the Gospel of Luke at both churches, developing a training course for lay preachers and offering training for lay members to assist with visitation for both congregations. Offering an informational session for new members at First and plan for the mid-week Lent services.

Challenges/Roadblocks. Between funerals and all of the meetings for both congregations, I am finding it hard to cover the visitation needs for both churches along with regular ministry responsibilities.

Lessons Learned/Opportunities for Improvement. As I am reading the book "Gospel Fluency: Speaking the Truths of Jesus into the Everyday Stuff of Life" by Jeff Vanderstelt, I am being challenged to think about how consistently I speak about Jesus in my ministry and in all areas of my life. Are we as a church consistently speaking about Jesus?

Pastoral Acts. Funeral for Daniel King on 12.20.24. Funeral for Lawrence Clark at First on 1.4.25. Baptisms of Aker Olsen at First and Bently Tetzlaff at Grace on 1.12.25.

In addition, Pastor received and shared a Thank You note from Lutheran Social Services expressing their gratitude for our annual support.

Committee Reports.

Fellowship and Caring. Jody reported that the group met yesterday. They will continue to encourage others to sign up for fellowship. The annual report is completed. Upcoming events include; putting together a basket for the Bingo Event, sending Valentine cards to shut-ins, and Palm Sunday brunch. They are also looking into giving items from the Caring Closet to the Berlin High School, as they have an in-house needs program, and some items in the closet are becoming outdated. Next meeting is 2.16.25

Building and Grounds. Bob reported that he has met with a Krumenauer representative, receiving quotes for a new commercial dishwasher. The door type model dishwasher quote is \$7,135.00, the ventless door type model

quote is \$12,895. Other work completed includes; snow removal and salting, furnace filters were changed and is researching hot water heater pressure concerns. Future needs include snow removal, salting as needed and continuing dishwasher research if council approves. Next meeting is on 2.11.25.

Christian Education. Anita reported that the group has not met. Reminded members that Christian Ed. will pay half the cost of upcoming Summer Camps. She also encouraged members to share the Weekly Bible Study via their social media.

Worship and Music. Heidi provided a written report including her recap of Advent and Christmas services. Choir has resumed and will sing 1.19. Praise Team will resume on 1.15 and sing on 2.23. 'The Scott Street Puppets', will perform at a Joint Parish service on 2.9 at 10am, with a potluck following. The committee will meet on 1.19 to start planning for midweek Lenten Services. A Joint Parish service is planned for Palm Sunday, 4.13 at 10am. Heidi also shared that the Bingo posters and yard signs are complete and articles have been written for the paper.

Mission and Outreach. Craig reported that the Mission for January is hurricane disaster relief. Reported that in late 2024 two massive hurricanes struck Florida and the southeast part of the U.S. Hurricanes Helene and Milton left devastation in their wake. There was heavy rain and wind, deadly flooding, and powerful storm surges. Millions of people were left without power. These were some of the area's strongest hurricanes in decades. Recovery efforts take time and people are still feeling the effects. Immediate help was sent in the form of food, water, and clothing from many states including Wisconsin, but a long time response is needed. Recovery doesn't happen overnight. Major disasters require time, work, and money to repair what was lost. Hopefully Grace will support the people who were hard hit last December. February Mission will be Damascus Road.

Finance. Terry provided the written report as follows.

- 1. Budget vs Actuals-2024 is the first year that giving decreased a little, (decrease of \$8000.00) since the split. We decided that passing the plate on Christmas (and probably Easter) was lucrative as the giving at Christmas doubled what was given last year. (offering of \$200.00 received Christmas 2024)
- 2. Want to include a pie chart or Narrative report of 2024 actual income and expenses in the Annual report to make easier reading for those who
- 3. Council has approved the budget for 2025.
- 4. We discussed making the bulletins in black and white ink vs. color as that could save \$1500.00/year. We would still print reports (including Annual) and special projects in color.
- 5. Sandy talked to RBC and they will set up the new Auxiliary Fund whenever we want. She did talk with woman Becky Guden referred her to who will help with Quik Book to clarify how to do the accounting.
- 6. We discussed at length how and when to present the idea to the Congregation of using some of the Leonard Jones Fund for community outreach based on a percent of the fund. (Suggestion was 1% of 5 year average of year end totals). We decided to recommend to Council at their Monday Jan. 13 meeting that we do a presentation at the Annual meeting giving a little history of the Leonard Jones Fund; share it's growth and ask interested congregation members to join a committee to look into this and develop a plan, criteria and parameters for how this would be done if approved by the Congregation (in the future). Sue agreed to put together a rough outline of the points we want to recommend to the Council and have Finance Committee members review and edit so we can have it ready for next Monday's Council meeting.
- 7. Next Meeting- Tuesday Feb. 18, 2025 at 1pm. Respectively submitted by Terry Wallace Investment. Jean Dretske provided a written copy of our investments. All investments showed a loss in December.

Unfinished Business.

Commercial Dishwasher. Terry recommended that the council purchase a new water softener, as one is needed for the existing sanitizer or new dishwasher. Terry indicated that the plan is to go with the ventless type dishwasher model, (\$12,895). This figure does not include the cost of kitchen demolition and repair of the area needed for the dishwasher or for the installation of the dishwasher. In addition he stated that the present hot water heater is not functioning properly, it is 8 years old. He indicated that this may be why the present sanitizer may not be functioning efficiently. He also stated that a new water softener would need to be purchased, as one is required to ensure proper functioning of a new dishwasher. Discussion ensued regarding the purchase of a new water softener and the cleaning or replacing of the present hot water heater. Terry made a motion to allow Buildings and Grounds to spend up to \$3000.00 to clean the present hot water heater and to purchase a new water

softener, motion seconded by Craig, motion carried. Pastor added to the motion that the \$3000.00 can be funded through the Capital Improvement Fund. 2025 Council Goals. Linda presented the Congregational Council Goals for 2025

- 1. Develop lay leadership for Bible studies, leading worship, and even preaching.
- 2. Develop Visitation ministry
- 3. Incorporate more youth into worship services

Linda will submit articles for the newsletter and the bulletins to ask for input and feedback from the congregation.

New Business.

Ink Costs for Bulletins. Discussion held on cost of color ink vs black ink for weekly bulletins. Linda shared the costs that Sandy had compiled. Weekly bulletins printed in color are \$.22, black and white are \$.02. Decision made to return to black and white ink for weekly bulletins and to utilize colored ink bulletins for special occasions and holidays, saving an annual cost of approximately \$1500.00.

Finance Committee Recommendation. Terry provided this written documentation.

The Finance Committee is making a recommendation to Council to have a short presentation at the Feb. 2025 Annual meeting asking for Congregational participation on a committee that would establish criteria and set parameters for using a small amount of the Leonard Jones fund for community outreach.

We feel it would be important to include in that presentation the following information:

- -Feeling so Blessed to have been gifted this money and how it has grown. This would be a way to give back to the community.
- -There are members of the Congregation who feel this money should be partially spent in outreach in the community and not just for Grace Lutheran itself.
- -History of Leonard Jones and what he expressed in his will about why he was gifting this money to Berlin and groups he wanted to help or to see benefit from the money. (Jean)
- -Share with Congregation the gains in the Fund despite what we have used.
- -This committee could develop a protocol for how money could be distributed and determine criteria as to who and where. For example, if it is decided to distribute 1% of a five-year average of the total fund year end totals, in 2024 that would have been \$12,000.00
- -Interested persons should contact a Council member.

Pastor also suggested that once this recommendation is presented, a committee has been established, and a criteria has been set that this committee will bring it back to the congregation for approval.

Closing Prayer. Provided by Pastor Rebekah.

Adjournment. Motion made by Bob to adjourn, seconded by Terry, motion carried. Meeting adjourned at 8:12pm.

"The Sound of Gravel" by Ruth Wariner is the book the Grace Book Club has chosen as their read for March. Ruth Wariner was the thirty-ninth of her father's forty-two children. Growing up on a farm in rural Mexico, where authorities turn a blind eye to the practices of her community, Ruth lives in a ramshackle house without indoor plumbing or electricity.

At church, preachers teach that God will punish the wicked by destroying the world and that women can only ascend to Heaven by entering into polygamous marriages and giving birth to as many children as possible. After Ruth's father—the man who had been the founding prophet of the colony—is brutally murdered by his brother in a bid for church power, her mother remarries, becoming the second wife of another faithful congregant.

In need of government assistance and supplemental income, Ruth and her siblings are carted back and forth between Mexico and the United States, where Ruth's mother collects welfare, and her stepfather works a variety of odd jobs. Ruth comes to love the time she spends in the States, realizing that perhaps the community into which she was born is not the right one for her. As she begins to doubt her family's beliefs and question her mother's choices, she struggles to balance her fierce love for her siblings with her determination to forge a better life for herself.
