Grace Lutheran's Mission: We Gather to Worship, Grow, Care, and Share "All Are Welcome In This Place"

From Pastor Rebekah:

My social media was blowing up with reports and discussions about an event that happened in Kentucky early in February at Asbury University. Some called it a revival, others an awakening. Regardless of what you call it, I find it beautiful and inspiring.

So, what happened? On February 8, following a chapel service, students spontaneously stayed in the auditorium for prayer and singing that continuing through the night and as of my writing this article, has continued for two weeks sparking similar movements on other college campuses and getting the attention of people around the world.

I'll admit I was curious about the message that seemed to spark this response, so I found a recording of the chapel sermon on YouTube. It was based on a reading from Romans 12:9-21. These 13 verses include 30 different commands. They are overwhelming. But the preacher reminded the audience that we cannot do these commands or actions by our own merit. They are only possible as an expression of love.

"Let love be genuine; hate what is evil; hold fast to what is good; love one another with mutual affection; outdo one another in showing honor." – Romans 12:9-10

The preacher spoke about how many people don't know true love having experienced abuse, perverted, hypocritical love. But that is not the love of God. God's love is perfect love, agape love, gentle and kind. God is love. Until we have tasted and seen the love of Jesus, we can't truly love others. You cannot love until you are loved by Jesus. First John 4:19 tells us "We love because God first loved us." God sent His only Son to die for the sins of every person. There was only one reason for God to experience that kind of heartache: God's love for us. God's love is unconditional, extravagant, and everlasting. And it's for everyone. Love for others is only possible when we know and experience God's love for us in Jesus. Then and only then can we become love in action.

So, what is the source of your love? Some of us need to taste and see and experience the love of God. How do we do that? We can get to know God's love by reading the Bible. If you are not reading the Bible regularly today is a good day to start. Try reading one of the gospels. (Mark is the shortest.) Or if that is overwhelming try reading Philippians or 1 John. Check out the YouVersion Bible App and pick a reading plan about God's love. As you read, let the words soak in, reflect on them, mediate on them. What do they reveal about God's love? Prayer is another way to experience God's love. Talk with God about what you are reading. Ask God to reveal his love for you.

Worship is also an important way of experiencing God's love. Some of us need to taste and see, sit in the love of God. Our mid-week Lent series this year is all about the love of God. If you haven't heard the messages, I encourage you to go back and watch them on YouTube or Facebook. Make worship a priority for the rest of the Lent season so you can know more deeply God's love for you.

We need to know God's love for us, experience God's love poured out for us. Then and only then are we able to share love with the world around us. When you see yourself the way God sees you, you can love others the way God loves you. The world desperately needs this kind of love. The world needs a bunch of Christians who've experienced the love of God pouring it out on others. The world doesn't need more judgment or condemnation, the world needs love. True love. Love that transforms lives.

REGULAR GRACE ENGLISH LUTHERAN CHURCH CONGREGATIONAL COUNCIL MEETING – FELLOWSHIP HALL Monday, January 9, 2023

Present: Bill Bartlett, Cindy Wallace, Becky Guden, Tricia Prellwitz, Linda Reetz, Sue Shemanski, Matt Dretske, Craig Chovanec and Jody Ziemann, Intern Kathy Cartwright and Pastor Rebekah Tarras.

President Bill Bartlett called the meeting to order at 7:08 p.m. and Linda Reetz led us in opening prayer.

The December Council minutes were presented. Cindy Wallace made a motion to accept the minutes; Jody Ziemann seconded. Motion approved.

Ministry Reports:

Pastor Rebekah's report listed her and Intern Kathy's activities in December which included home visits; preparing for Cantata and Christmas services; various meetings and end of year reports.

Cindy Wallace presented the December Treasurer's Report. Sue Shemanski made a motion to accept this report as presented; Matt Dretske seconded. Motion approved. The December Check Detail was reviewed; Jody Ziemann made a motion to approve all checks as written; Sue Shemanski seconded. Motion approved.

Bill Bartlett reviewed the December investments spreadsheet on all funds. With the markets still being volatile, there was a loss and Bill stated that for 2022, funds were at an overall loss of 8.3%, which is below the average.

Buildings & Grounds Committee Report was presented by Matt Dretske for December noting the Emergency light by the south doors was still in need of repair, an electrician had been contacted but has not responded; also the East door frame by the kitchen will be in need of repair and best to contact a door company. A service contract to cover heating and cooling units was discussed and will be passed on to the committee to solicit.

Sue Shemanski advised the Christian Education Committee has yet to meet and they will discuss the Vacation Bible School scheduled for July; and they are starting to prepare for the Fat Tuesday Pancake Supper in February.

The Fellowship & Caring Committee report was given by Jody Ziemann. She noted that when there is no host for Fellowship on a Sunday, the committee will fill in; Committee has offered to help with the Ding Dong Dinner project; Valentines and cookies will be prepared and delivered to the shut-ins in February; and committee will help with Fat Tuesday if needed.

Tricia Prellwitz presented the Worship & Music Committee report listing the Choir and Joyful Noise schedules for January; Lenten services will use the Holden Evening Prayer Service; other ideas for 2023 discussed were hosting a guest painter which he does a painting while listening and focusing on that Sunday's gospel; Capella groups to lead worship; Christian Rock Service; and the Polka Service for end of August. Tricia is working with a company on material samples to replace the cushioned kneelers and upholstery on the two chairs, which a congregation member has graciously donated funds for this project.

Craig Chovanec of Mission & Outreach Committee advised the January mission is Lutheran World Relief. He also talked about the upcoming Ding Dong Dinner project his committee has headed but is need of volunteers. This project will be the second Saturday of the month for January, February and March. January's dinner will be a pasta meal.

No concerns from the audience.

Old Business:

Bill Bartlett reminded the Grace Executive Council that the next Joint Parish Council Meeting will be Monday, March 20, 2023, at 6:30 p.m. at Grace Fellowship Hall. Information should be passed on to the new council members.

Council reviewed the Leave Policy for both Rostered Leaders and Part-time Salaried Staff with a few changes made from last month and had been approved by the Joint Parish Council. Sue Shemanski made a motion to approve the Leave Policy for Rostered Leaders as presented; Cindy Williams seconded. Motion approved. Linda Reetz made a motion to approve the Leave Policy for Part-Time Salaried Staff; Jody Ziemann seconded. Motion approved.

New Business:

The 2023 Budget was presented and reviewed. After discussion, Linda Reetz made a motion to approve the 2023 Budget that will be presented at the Annual Meeting; Matt Dretske seconded. Motion approved.

The Endowment Committee has submitted their recommendations for disbursement in 2023 totaling \$3,301, which will be divided between the Outreach Project of Ding Dong Dinner, Berlin School District Needy Family Fund and Scholarships for students that are Grace members. Linda Reetz made a motion to approve the Endowment Committee disbursements for 2023; Sue Shemanski seconded. Motion approved.

A resolution to Grace's Constitution will be presented at the Annual Meeting to establish a specific Scholarship Fund separate from the Endowment Committee. Details will be given at the meeting to create this new Fund and congregation will vote whether to establish this new Fund or not.

In other concerns brought to the council was the Audit Report after their review of the 2022 accounting procedures and this report will be in the Annual Report.

Pastor Rebekah led us in a Closing Prayer. Linda Reetz made a motion to adjourn; Tricia Prellwitz seconded. Motion approved. Meeting was adjourned at 8:15 p.m.

Where Do My Offerings Go?

In the past few weeks, I've had a few conversations with individuals who tell me they don't know where they should designate their offering so they didn't write anything down on their envelope and we can just decide what to do with it.

I'll admit, at first, I was confused. In my mind you are giving to God through the church. I have my tithe set up automatically through the online giving option of each congregation and it goes to the general fund. The general fund is used for all the general expenses of the church and our ministry – utilities that provide water, heat and lights, worship and communion supplies, Sunday school supplies, office supplies to make and print bulletins, newsletters and more, plus it covers staff salaries, benevolence, and all of the other expenses that are occurred in maintaining a facility and supporting the ministry of the church. I don't feel the need to make any designations because I trust that my giving will be used as needed to carry out the mission of the church.

However, the more I reflected on this topic, I realized that I do occasionally make additional offerings that are designated for a purpose. I have designated offerings beyond my tithe to the monthly missions, ding dong dinners, soul food and other projects. I consider these designations to be above and beyond my regular giving. I give them when I sense God encouraging me to give to these special needs.

I would encourage you to make your tithe or offerings to the general fund because that is what supports the general ministry of the church. When you feel called to do so, go ahead and make designated gifts but don't feel that your gifts need to be designated. If you have any questions about where your offering goes, please feel free to talk to me, someone in the office or one of the council members.



Mission of the Month - Turkey Disaster



LUTHERAN WORLD RELIEF RESPONSE

We are delivering aid and support to children, women and men devasted by the earthquakes in Türkiye (Turkey). According to the Turkish Disaster and Emergency Management Authority (AFAD) and recent UN Flash Appeal, more than 9.1 million people have been affected in 11 provinces in Türkiye and more than 47,000 buildings have been destroyed or damaged since the initial earthquake struck on February 6, 2023.

Grace Lutheran's mission of the month is Lutheran World Relief specifically providing aid to Turkey following the earthquakes.

The most urgent needs are: • Food • Warm bedding and winter clothes • Lighting for camps to improve safety especially for women and children • Hygiene kits • Toilets and bathing facilities • Psychosocial first aid and mental health services • Child friendly spaces

Our response in Turkey includes: •

Shipping LWR Quilts, Baby Care Kits and Personal Care Kits. • Airlifting urgently needed supplies including tents, tarps, winter clothing and solar lights. An initial shipment arrived in Türkiye on February 20. • Coordinating with partners to distribute ready-to-eat food and hot meals, sleeping bags, sleeping mats and winter clothing. • Conducting rapid needs assessments in affected area

We are grateful for the thousands of Lutherans across the United States whose care and generosity have made it possible for us to respond immediately. At this time, financial gifts are the number one need to assist families affected by the earthquakes.



The midweek worship services will be 1:30 pm at First Lutheran, Poy Sippi and 6:30 pm at Grace Lutheran, Berlin.

The theme this year will be "God's Love is Shown." The sermon series will delve into the rich and diverse aspects of our Lord's love for us shown most clearly in the life, suffering, death and resurrection of Jesus.
