Grace Lutheran's Mission: We Gather to Worship, Grow, Care, and Share "All Are Welcome In This Place"

From Pastor Rebekah:

"A record of the genealogy of Jesus the Messiah, the son of David, the son of Abraham... She will give birth to a son, and you are to give him the name Jesus, because he will save his people from their sins." Matthew 1:1 and 21

As I was reading my devotions in the season of Advent, I kept thinking about what it must have been like for Zechariah or Mary or Joseph to hear a message from the Lord. It had been four hundred years since the Hebrew people heard from God. During that time middle eastern empires rose and fell, and the tiny nation of Israel suffered under the domination of greater powers like Greece and Rome. ¹

And then something momentous happened. A baby was born - a baby unlike any who had ever come before. But what is most important is not just the baby, it is the fulfillment of God's promise in the Old Testament to send a Messiah.

People all over the world had been eagerly waiting the Messiah. They believed his coming would change the entire history of the world. Could this baby be the long-expected king?

To answer that question, the Gospel of Matthew begins with a genealogy tracing Jesus' lineage back to Abraham, the father of the Jewish race, and includes David the great Jewish king. Matthew starts with Jesus' roots to show the connection of Jesus' arrival with the Old Testament story line. Jesus was a Jew, the son of Abraham. And, a king, the son of David. He is indeed the Messiah they were waiting for, the fulfillment of God's promises throughout history and the continuation of God's work.

This year our lectionary readings are primarily focused on the life and ministry of Jesus as it is recorded in the Gospel Matthew. Each Gospel writer has their own unique way of telling the story. They gathered all the stories and traditions about Jesus into a coherent understandable story for the early Christian communities. Scholars believe each writer was responding to the needs of a particular Christian community in a particular location and time.

Matthew seems to be writing specifically to people of the Jewish community to show that Jesus was indeed the long-awaited Messiah according to Jewish tradition. Jesus' life is shown as the fulfillment of the promises God made to the Jewish people throughout their history. Jesus is often shown to be a true teacher of the Jewish Law. The Gospel describes Jesus' teaching in a simple effective way. This would indeed be very helpful for those becoming early Christians. Particularly, Matthew connects the continuity between Judaism and Christianity ².

While written hundreds of years ago, Matthew's gospel is still relevant for us today. Scholars believe it was probably written during the decade 80-90 AD when the early church was experiencing many trials and tribulations and was intended to offer Christians hope. And isn't hope something we could all use today as well? Matthew's Gospel also contains some of the most practical insights for every day living. As we begin our journey through the Gospel of Matthew this year, may you be renewed in hope and insight for living as a follower of Jesus.

REGULAR GRACE ENGLISH LUTHERAN CHURCH CONGREGATIONAL COUNCIL MEETING – FELLOWSHIP HALL Monday, November 14, 2022

Present: Bill Bartlett, Cindy Wallace, Tricia Prellwitz, Sue Shemanski, Matt Dretske, Jody Ziemann, Craig Chovanec, Linda Reetz, Intern Pastor Kathy Cartwright, and Pastor Rebekah Tarras.

President Bill Bartlett called the meeting to order at 7:00 pm and Pastor Rebekah led us in opening devotions.

The October minutes were presented. Jody Ziemann moved to approve the minutes. Sue Shemanski seconded the motion. Motion Approved.

Ministry Reports:

Pastor Rebekah presented her written report listing church related activities in the past month.

The October Treasurer's Report from Cindy Wallace was reviewed. Craig Chovanec moved to approve as presented. Matt Dretske seconded. Motion approved. The October Check Detail was then reviewed and Sue Shemanski made a motion to approve all checks as presented. Matt Dretske seconded. Motion approved.

Bill Bartlett explained the Investment spreadsheet shows some improvement over the past month, but that the market remains volatile.

Matt Dretske presented the Building and Grounds report. Leaves are done, the winter supplies are out and ready, the person doing snow plowing will continue to plow for our church, the emergency light between the South entry doors continues to not work and an electrician has been contacted.

Christian Ed committee spokesperson, Sue Shemanski shared that the Advent wreath making event will happen on Wednesday, November 16 with a spaghetti supper, explanation of Advent, and then wreath making. The response has been quite high. The committee members will also begin planning during the month of January for VBS to be held sometime in July. Jeff Tarras will be the lead person hosting a sports-related VBS aimed at elementary age students in the community.

Jody Ziemann presented the Fellowship and Caring committee report. Ding Dong Dinners will be handed over to the Mission and Outreach committee. However, Christmas cookie plates will be made and delivered to the homebound. Future activities will be valentines for the homebound and Fat Tuesday pancake meal with Bingo to kick off the Lenten season.

Worship and Music report was presented by Tricia Prellwitz. There continues to be a dead spot for the microphones in the middle of the altar area, the music schedules have been set for upcoming months, the idea of having a Christian rock Sunday similar to Polka Sunday will be explored, the use of a song leader to teach congregation members when learning new songs will be tried, exploring a church musical with Jeff Tarras as the person in charge will need further discussion.

Craig Chovanec gave the Mission of the Month report. We currently are focusing on Sudan relief, next month will be Good Gifts. The committee will be meeting soon to select the roster of Missions for each month of 2023.

Old Business:

Bill Bartlett announced that the Grace Lutheran officers will join the First Lutheran officers for a Joint Council Meeting on December 19, 2022, 6:30 pm at First Lutheran.

Christmas Day services have been finalized. Sue Shemanski moved to offer an online service and a joint service at First Lutheran beginning at 10:30 am. Jody Ziemann seconded the motion. Motion approved. Breakfast will also be service at the First Lutheran service.

Decorating of the Christmas tree will be on Saturday, December 3, 9:00 am. Council members are responsible for obtaining a tree, putting the tree up, and decorating the church. Announcements will be made that all members are welcome to come and help.

Linda Reetz shared the Congregation Survey Committee suggestions. An Ad Hoc committee consisting of Pam Marks, Jean Dretske, Scott and Karen Schweigert, Jeff Tarras, and Linda Reetz compiled the results of the surveys completed by congregation members. The suggestions were shared with church committees and the Council. It will be up to the committees and pastoral staff as to which suggestions might be implemented.

Continuation of the Internship program was discussed. Bill Bartlett shared estimated costs between Grace Lutheran and First Lutheran if the respective congregations vote to apply for an Intern during 2023-24. Estimated costs will be shared at the special congregation meeting on Sunday, December 4 following the worship service. Any questions or concerns from congregation members will be addressed prior to the vote.

Tom McCarthy has agreed to serve a three-year term on the Audit Committee. Cindy Wallace moved to approve Tom McCarthy as a member of the Audit Committee. Craig Chovanec seconded. Motion carried.

New Business:

The annual meeting will be Sunday, January 29, 2023 following the church service.

Pastor Rebekah's compensation package for 2023 was presented. It follows our synod's guidelines. Sue Shemanski made a motion to approve the 2023 pastor compensation package. Jody Ziemann seconded. Motion approved.

The church needs to create a sick leave policy. It was discovered that there is not a current policy. When the policy is created, it will cover pastoral staff as well as salaried staff. The new sick leave policy will be presented at the December meeting for discussion and approval.

Becky Guden has been working on the church's inventory for the insurance company. All the pictures have been taken and now a cost value to ever item in the inventory is being added.

A request from ThedaCare to use the Fellowship Hall on December 5,6, or 7 from 11:30-1:30 was approved.

The current check signing authorization procedure was discussed. Currently, two council officers are the only authorized signees. Bill Bartlett moved to allow the office staff member most familiar with the church's finances (currently that is Sandy Peschke) and one council officer to be given authorization to sign checks. Craig Chovanec seconded the motion. Motion was approved.

The results of Pastor Rebekah Tarras' evaluation were shared.

Closing prayer was led by Pastor Rebekah.

Tricia Prellwitz made a motion to adjourn. Sue Shemanski seconded. Motion approved. The meeting adjourned at 8:24 pm.


